



LEAP Assessment Guide, Social Studies Grade 4

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I. Purpose of Assessment Guide

This document is designed to assist Louisiana educators in understanding the LEAP Social Studies assessment for grade 4, which will be administered in both paper and online formats in spring 2017.

II. Introduction to LEAP Social Studies Assessments

The Department is committed to administering consistent and rigorous assessments in social studies. All students in grades 3 through 8 will take LEAP grade-specific summative assessments in social studies measuring the 2011 Louisiana Social Studies standards and Grade-Level Expectations (GLEs). The Spring 2017 LEAP Social Studies assessments will be operational tests created using questions from the Spring 2016 Social Studies Field Test.

The LEAP Social Studies assessments will offer the following:

- Grade-specific assessments in grades 3 through 8
- Measurement of the full range of Louisiana content standards in social studies
- Ability to measure the full range of student performance, including the performance of high- and low-performing students
- Flexibility in test administration for grades 3 and 4, with both paper- and computer-based testing available

III. Design of LEAP Social Studies Assessment

Content and Claims

The new LEAP Social Studies assessments provide students with opportunities to demonstrate their understanding of social studies through a variety of item types and to engage with source documents while developing **claims** about social studies **content** and concepts.

The instructional priorities for social studies are reflected in the summative assessment.

- Content: Students answer meaningful questions to demonstrate an understanding of social studies content and concepts.
- **Claims**: Students apply understanding of social studies **content** and concepts by expressing and developing **claims** that make connections and/or show relationships among ideas, people, and events within and across time and place.

Test Design

The LEAP Social Studies assessments have a **set-based** design.

- One to four related source documents anchor sets of four to six questions.
- Questions ask students to use prior content knowledge and the source documents to show an understanding of social studies content and concepts.
- Item sets include selected-response (i.e., multiple-choice and/or multiple-select) questions and some sets culminate with a short constructed response.
- The task set contains selected-response questions and an extended response. The extended-response item is worth up to 8 points and scored using a two-dimensional rubric measuring content and claims.

Source Documents

Sets include a variety of source documents, such as:

- an excerpt from a text-based primary or secondary source
- an authentic or historical map
- a chart, table, or graph

- a timeline or series of events
- graphic organizer or diagram
- an illustration, painting, or photograph
- a historical poster or political cartoon

Item Types

- <u>Selected Response (SR)</u>: This item type includes traditional multiple-choice (MC) questions with four answer options and only one correct answer, as well as multiple-select (MS) questions with more than four answer options and two or more correct answers. All SR items are worth 1 point each. MS questions for grade 4 have five to six answer options. The stem of the question identifies the number of correct answers students should fill in.
- <u>Constructed Response (CR)</u>: This item type appears at the end of some item sets and asks students to write a brief response to a question that will be scored using a rubric with a 0-to-2-point scale. Some CR items may include two parts in order to support the assignment of 2 score points.
- Extended Response (ER): This item type appears at the end of the task set. The ER item asks students to write an in-depth response that expresses and develops a claim, incorporating their knowledge of social studies content and concepts along with evidence from the source documents. The ER item is worth up to 8 points and scored using a two-dimensional rubric, measuring content and claims. Each dimension is scored using a 0-to-4 point rubric.

In spring 2017, students will take full-length, operational LEAP Social Studies assessments. The Grade 4 test contains six (6) operational item sets, twelve (12) discrete stand-alone items, and a task set. The test also contains embedded field test items (i.e., 2 item sets and 3 discrete stand-alone items) that do not count toward students' scores. In comparison, the Spring 2016 Social Studies Field Tests were shortened forms containing 4 to 5 item sets (depending upon grade level), a handful of discrete stand-alone items, and a task set.

The following information outlines the design of the Grade 4 Social Studies Assessment.

Standards Assessed

All 2011 Louisiana Social Studies standards and Grade Level Expectations (GLEs) for grade 4 are eligible for assessment, including all units in the <u>Social Studies Scope and Sequence for Grade 4</u>. Item sets that assess content from the final unit include carefully chosen source documents that allow students to respond using their social studies skills and content knowledge from previous units. The task set, which contains the extended-response question, will not assess content from the final unit.

The percentage of score points by reporting category for the item sets and discrete items is shown in the table below. As the strand to be addressed by the task set varies by year, the percentages by reporting categories do not take the task set into account.

IV. Sample Test Items

A sample <u>item set</u> and <u>task set</u>, providing examples of how content and claims may be assessed in a grade 4, are available. The sets include source documents, selected-, constructed-, and extended-response questions.

All students will be provided the following testing materials:

- Scratch paper
- Two sharpened no. 2 pencils with good erasers (extras should be available)
- Extended Response Checklist for grades 3, 4, and 5

VI. Test Administration Policies

Administration Schedule

The LEAP Social Studies assessment will be administered April 3 – May 5, 2017, and will be available to schools as paper-based tests (PBT) or computer-based tests (CBT).




Students in grades 3 and 4 may take LEAP Social Studies online or on paper.

Paper-Based Tests

The paper-based tests will utilize consumable test booklets. Students, except those using braille test materials, will enter all answers in their test booklets. There will be no separate answer documents.


Multiple-Choice questions have four options. Students will fill in the bubble of the correct answer.







Multiple-Select questions for grade 4 have five to seven answer options. Students will fill in the number of correct answers identified in the stem of the question. The sample below asks for two correct answers.

The following information presents guidelines for marking/writing in the LEAP Social Studies Test booklet.

- Students are encouraged to mark the sources and questions in the test booklet (e.g., highlight or underline evidence, annotate the source document(s), circle key words in the questions, etc.), especially as part of their preparation in responding to the extended-response portion of the task.
- Students may use yellow highlighters to highlight text in the test booklet.
- Highlighting text in options and placing an X to the right of the text in an option are recommended ways for students to eliminate options. However, crossing out options could create scoring issues if students mark through answer circles.

When students are answering items requiring written responses, they should make sure to write their responses in the space(s) provided. Any information written outside the space or which has been scratched out in the printed test booklet will not be scored.

Computer-Based Tests

Students taking the grade 4 LEAP Social Studies will enter their answers into the online testing system. The way each answer is entered depends on the item type. When composing their written responses for a constructed- or extended-response question, students will type their responses into an answer box using the typing tools provided.

The computer-based tests include the following online tools, which allow a student to select answer choices, "mark" items, eliminate answer options, take notes, enlarge the item, guide the reading of a text or an item line by line (similar to what a student can do on the paper-based tests), and access the Extended-Response Checklist. A help tool is also featured to assist students as they use the online system.

All students taking the computer-based assessment should work through the Online Tools Training available through INSIGHT to practice using the online tools so they are well prepared to navigate the online testing system.
